Donna joined the RCN as Head of Nursing in 2015, she was then promoted and joined the RCN Executive Team to Director of Nursing, Policy and Practice in 2016, where her key role is to work with UK-wide RCN staff to drive and implement the future RCN professional nursing, policy and practice strategy.

Prior to joining the RCN Donna held various roles including Clinical Director of Emergency Medicine; Executive Director of Nursing and Director of Commissioning.

Donna advised the PM's Commission on the future of Nursing and Midwifery in 2010 and served as nurse/child health assessor to the Victoria Climbié Inquiry.

Jim Campbell is the Director of the Health Workforce Department at the World Health Organization (WHO). The department's work includes the State of the World's Nursing Report, WHO's Global Strategy on Human Resources for Health: Workforce 2030, the report of the High-level Commission on Health Employment and Economic Growth and the subsequent adoption of the ILO, OECD, WHO action plan on Working for Health to implement the Commission's recommendations. He coordinates the Global Health Workforce Network engaging member states and relevant partners in WHO's work.

Prior to joining WHO and GHWA he spent eight years as the founder/Director of a not-for-profit research institute. His publications include A Universal Truth: No Health Without a Workforce (2013), and the State of the World's Midwifery reports (2011 and 2014). He is a Board member of the International Institute for Educational Planning.

Sheila McClelland is the CEO of the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Ireland (NMBI), the independent, statutory organisation which regulates the nursing and midwifery professions in Ireland.

Since joining in mid-2019 Sheila has energetically supported the internal team through a review of the 'process and execution' of the organisation, with the aim of ensuring that the NMBI brief and output are fit for purpose as our sector evolves.

Under her guidance the organisation has conducted a number of consultations with its key stakeholders, most important among which are the 79,000+ NMBI registered nurses and midwives. Sheila is also supporting the registration team as it works to deliver MyNMBI, a new online registration system that will support students, graduates, HEIs, applicants and registrants.

Sheila and her team have worked hard during the pandemic to facilitate all those who meet Irish standards the opportunity to enter the Irish healthcare system, expediting over 2,000 new registrations and restorations, making the Register of Nurses and Midwives the largest it has ever been.

During this period NMBI has also played a key role with the Department of Health, the HSE and the academic community, developing solutions for student nurses and midwives to maximise learning and service delivery in the context of the pandemic and the standards required for registration.

Sheila's commitment to public service has been steadfast during the career. Sheila has been an expert panel member of the UK Competition and Markets Authority since October 2017. She has also been the Chair of the Consumer Council of Northern Ireland since April 2015. Sheila was appointed as a transformation change director in the Council for Curriculum, Education and Assessment, was Chief Executive in a local authority and worked in the political system at the Northern Ireland Assembly, the Northern Ireland Office and Westminster.

She held the nation's first endowed chair in Caring Science for 16 years and holds fifteen (15) Honorary Doctoral Degrees, including 12 International Honorary Doctorates. Her work is studied and implemented around the world. She is a widely published author and recipient of many awards and honors and has authored and co-authored over 30 books on caring. In 2013, Prof. Watson was inducted as a Living Legend by the American Academy of Nursing, its highest honor.

Prof. Watson's primary fields include: Philosophy -Theory of Human Caring Nursing; Unitary Human Caring Science; Caring Theory: Practice, education, research, administration.

Mary Jo Kreitzer, PhD, RN, FAAN is the Founder and Director of the Earl E. Bakken Center for Spirituality & Healing at the University of Minnesota where she also serves as a tenured professor in the School of Nursing. Within the School of Nursing, Professor Kreitzer is the co-lead of the Doctorate of Nursing Practice (DNP) program in integrative health and healing. She has served as the principal investigator or co-principal investigator of numerous clinical trials focusing on mindfulness meditation with persons with chronic disease including studies focusing on solid organ transplant, cardiovascular disease, chronic insomnia, diabetes, and caregivers of people with Alzheimer's disease. Current studies include the use of social technology to enhance healing and wellbeing and the impact of mindfulness on brain-computer interface performance.

Prof. Kreitzer has authored over 150 publications and is the co-editor of the text *Integrative Nursing 2nd Edition* published in 2018 by Oxford University Press.

She earned her doctoral degree in public health focused on health services research, policy and administration, and her master's and bachelor's degrees in nursing.

Prof. Owen Barr

Professor of Nursing and Intellectual Disabilities, School of Nursing, Ulster University, Londonderry, Northern Ireland

Professor Owen Barr is a Registered General Nurse. He is also a Registered Nurse Learning Disability and completed a Community Nursing Course: Learning Disabilities. He has worked in a number of hospital and community nursing posts in learning disability services in England and Northern Ireland before entering nurse education in 1994. Owen is now the Professor of Nursing and Intellectual Disabilities at Ulster University.

He has particular teaching and research interests in health needs of people with intellectual disabilities. This includes access to and equity of outcome from primary care and wider general healthcare services people for intellectual disabilities. Owen was a member of a Regulation and Quality Improvement Authority review team in 2014 that focused on access to general hospital care for people with intellectual disabilities. He was chair of the Regional General Hospital Forum: Learning Disabilities which led to the development of the Regional Hospital Passport for people with learning disabilities, which was launched in May 2017 and replaced all the previous hospital passports used in Northern Ireland. This document is now the subject of a PhD study in Letterkenny and Sligo University Hospitals. He has also been involved in research about the end of life care for people with intellectual disabilities. Owen has been involved in reviewing and commenting on the care provided to people with intellectual disabilities with intellectual disability services in the UK and Ireland.

Owen is recognised nationally and internationally as an established author and teacher. He holds a Principal Fellowship of the Higher Education Academy and was awarded a National Teaching Fellowship in 2020. Owen has written widely, with over 100 publications, including being joint Editor of the Oxford Handbook of Learning and Intellectual Disability Nursing (2nd Edition).
